The year in review

Jared Echternach, CEO

2016 was a busy year for your cooperative. We completed the final year of our construction work plan, including major projects along Beltrami CR 39 (Scenic Highway), State Hwy. 1, Archery Road, Mission Road, the Red Lake substation feeder, and south of U.S. Hwy. 2 in Cass Lake. Crews also constructed more than 250 new services and performed more than 100 service improvements for our membership. It's a reassuring sign that our local economy continues to slowly grow.

While we continue to experience modest service growth, 2016 was another soft year in terms of energy sales. Two consecutive mild winters have resulted in decreased energy sales. This has placed upward pressure on rates as there are fewer kilowatt-hours over which to spread our fixed costs. Your board of directors recognizes this and is faced with the financial reality of fluctuating energy sales. If you recall the Polar Vortex of 2014, energy sales were robust and your cooperative was able to spread its fixed costs over more kilowatt-hours sold, helping all our members.

We experienced one major storm in 2016 as high winds ripped through our service area in July causing widespread outages in the southern portion of our system. We received help from neighboring cooperatives allowing us to restore power more quickly. The cost to repair your system as a result of this storm was approximately \$115,000 with no FEMA reimbursement funding available.

While we had our challenges in 2016, you can be extremely proud of your employees for all they

accomplished and for their dedicated response to the July storm.

Looking ahead

Last month I reported that your board of directors approved the next four-year construction work plan. These projects are designed to maintain and improve service reliability to our members. Major work for 2017 includes projects near the Red Lake Hospital, along State Hwy. 371 north of Walker, along 16th St. in Bemidji, along the North Plantagenet Rd. south of Bemidji and along Beltrami CR 39 (Scenic Highway). We also expect to build another 250 new services and perform 100 or so system improvements. These activities will keep our employees busy throughout the year. In addition, we will continue our meter changeout project with completion expected by the end of 2018.

Northern Solar

While it has been a long process, your board of directors has approved the construction of our Northern Solar community solar array. This is an 80-kilowatt (kW) array to be located at our headquarters facility. This project is a great example of how local control and decision making is much better than legislative or regulatory mandates. Members who want to participate in this project are able to do so and it's great to see progress being made. If you are interested in purchasing local, renewable energy without the cost and hassle of a rooftop system, this may be a good option for you.

New employee

I'd like to welcome a new employee to your cooperative.

Alex Ames was hired as a full-time apprentice line worker at the end of November. Alex worked for us this past summer as part of our seasonal apprentice line worker program and got a taste of real line work during our July storm. We're glad he's joining our cooperative family. If you see Alex

around town, please welcome him to the co-op.

5 tips for space heater safety in your home

As temperatures drop this winter, many will look for supplemental heating sources for their homes. Space heaters can be a good alternative for those who want to warm one area of their home without turning up the thermostat on the central heating system. However, space heaters are also responsible for 32 percent of house fires, according to the National Fire Protection Association. If you are planning to use a space heater in your home this winter, review these tips to keep you, your family and your property safe.

Materials – What are the components of your space heater made of? Parts like metal grating can be hot to the touch and may burn anyone who gets too close. Make sure you purchase a heater that is cool to the touch and has guards over the coils just in case little fingers get too close.

Placement – While it can be tempting to place a small heater on a shelf so it is not in the way of pets and children, it is safest to leave the heater on a level floor on a nonflammable surface. Keeping the space heater on the floor can keep it from

5. Load Management Program

Load management, commonly referred to as "off-peak," is a program developed by Minkota Power Cooperative, our wholesale power provider, that allows specific loads to be turned off during periods of peak electrical demand. This allows members to reduce the cost of their electric heating by reducing electrical demand expense and in exchange receiving the lower cost off-peak rate.

An adequate backup heating system is required to help meet your home's heating needs during these periods.



Subscribe to locally-produced, renewable solar energy today!

Beltrami Electric Cooperative is moving forward with our plan to build an 80-kilowatt (kW) Direct Current (DC) community solar array at our headquarters.

The array will consist of 180 photovoltaic panels, with a projected annual average of 450 kWh per panel or an average of 37.5 kWh/month. The array will produce more during the sunny days of summer and less during the short days of our Minnesota winters. To provide a point of reference, a residential electric bill averages around 1,253 kWh/month. Members will see the actual kWh production of their portion of the array credited on their electric bill at current electric rates, so if/when electric rates increase, your credit will too.

Community solar gardens like Northern Solar provide interested members an option to purchase renewable, locally-produced, solar energy without the hassle of installing, permitting, maintaining and insuring their own solar array. Members may subscribe to as many panels as they wish, up to the equivalent of their annual average usage. Members who wish to participate but may not want to commit to a subscription may choose to simply purchase a set amount of kWh/month from Northern Solar, up to their average usage, for an additional charge on their electric bill.

If you have been thinking about subscribing but haven't done so yet, the time is now! We have four different payment options, including options for members interested in subscribing to a panel(s) and members who simply want to purchase locally-produced solar energy on a Pay-As-You-Go basis with no contract. Contact our office today for more information.

5 tips for space heater safety in your home

falling over, preventing fire hazards. Also, remember that space heaters and bathrooms are not a good combination, unless the heater is designed for bathroom use. Moisture can damage the heater.

The most important rule about space heater placement is the 3-foot rule. Whether you are using the heater in the bedroom, living room or kitchen, space heaters should always be kept 3 feet away from flammable materials and out of the way of children and pets.

Special Features – Does your space heater have an auto shutoff function if tipped over? Auto shutoff can be a lifesaver. If you currently own a space heater without auto shutoff, consider purchasing a heater with this important safety feature.

Cords – You should never use an extension cord when plugging in a space heater as it can cause overheating. The space heater should be plugged directly into a wall outlet, and should be the only thing plugged into the wall outlet. Also make sure cords aren't in a high-traffic area so they are not a tripping hazard.

Use – Never leave a heater unattended while in use. If you are leaving your home or going to bed, make sure to unplug the heater.

Following these tips and making sure to follow the manufacturer's instructions can keep you safe this winter.

HOW TO CALCULATE THE COST OF RUNNING A PORTABLE ELECTRIC HEATER

First, convert watts to watt hours:

_____ watts / 1,000 = _____ kilowatts

Next, calculate the operating cost:

_____ kilowatts x .11¢ per hour

_____ ¢ per hour x _____ hours = \$ _____ per day

Electrical contractor continuing education sessions set for January, February



Minnkota Power Cooperative and the associated systems will again provide an opportunity for area electricians to obtain credits for license renewal by attending one of the six continuing education classes being offered throughout Minnkota's service area.

This marks the 29th year of the successful program, which is aimed at providing area trade allies with the latest information on electrical code and practices.

The electrical workshops will be held Jan. 17 and Jan. 18 at the Alerus Center in Grand Forks. The training then moves to the Cambria Hotel & Suites in West Fargo, Jan. 24 and Jan. 25. The workshops continue with classes Feb. 7 at the Eagles Club in Bemidji, Minn., and Feb. 8 at the Bigwood Event Center in Fergus Falls, Minn.

Since 1946, CAP has been instilling its core values (Integrity, Volunteer Service, Excellence and Respect) in youth, ages 12 to 21, through its Cadet Program. Participants are provided training in Communications, Aerospace Education, Medical and Emergency Services, Safety, Character Development, Leadership, Drug Prevention and Physical Fitness. They also learn to respect themselves and others, to mentor and be mentored and to enjoy serving their community. CAP cadets are not obligated to join any branch of the military service.



Northland Composite Squadron has members from the Bemidji, Laporte, Walker and Park Rapids areas. The cadets volunteer many hours of service in our community. They provide parking support at events such as the Beltrami County Fair, Paul Bunyan Antique Car Club Show and Ride for the Troops. They assist in sorting winter clothing for Coats for the Community, perform highway roadside cleanup and help with many youth events, such as the Jaycees Kiddie Carnival.

They honor our veterans through the Wreaths Across America program and serving at VFW dinners. The squadron also presents a Drug Demand Reduction program in local schools. They volunteer with disaster relief and search and rescue, and most recently, helped with the search for a local missing person.



Besides these tangible benefits of services provided, the lasting impact of this program is the formation of responsible young adults. Cadets in the program are held to a high standard of integrity and are expected to be respectful, honest, selfless in service and strive for excellence in all they do.
