Guests will travel on a charter bus from Bemidji Bus Line and enjoy a two-night stay at the Comfort Inn & Suites in Mandan, N.D.

- The cost to members for the three-day trip is \$100 per person or \$175 per double occupancy, which includes the bus fare, hotel, tours and meals.
- The tour is limited to ages 12 and older. Children 12 and older attend free with a parent/guardian.

We're ready for storm season. Are you?

Now that summer is in full swing, like many of you, I welcome more opportunities to be outdoors and enjoy the warmer weather. Summertime brings many of my favorite activities like cooking out with family and friends, afternoons on the water and simply slowing down a bit to enjoy life.

But summer months also make conditions right for dangerous storms. These potential weather events can cause destruction to our electrical system, but I want you to know that Beltrami Electric Cooperative crews are ready and standing by to respond should power outages occur in our area.

When major storms knock out power, our line crews take all necessary precautions before they get to work on any downed lines. I would encourage you to also practice safety and preparedness to protect your family during major storms and outages.



The Federal Emergency Management Agency recommends the items below as a starting point for storm and disaster preparedness, but you can visit **www.ready.gov** for additional resources.

- Stock your pantry with a three-day supply of nonperishable food, such as canned goods, energy bars, peanut butter, powdered milk, instant coffee, water and other essentials (i.e., diapers and toiletries).
- Confirm that you have adequate sanitation and hygiene supplies including towelettes, soap and hand sanitizer.
- Ensure your first-aid kit is stocked with pain relievers, bandages and other medical essentials, and make sure your prescriptions are current.
- Set aside basic household items you will need, including flashlights, batteries, a manual can opener and portable, battery-powered radio or TV.
- Organize emergency supplies so they are easily accessible in one location.

In the event of a prolonged power outage, turn off major appliances, TVs, computers and other sensitive electronics. This will help avert damage from a power surge and will also help prevent overloading the circuits during power restoration. That said, do leave one light on so you will know when power is restored. If you plan to use a small generator, make sure it's rated to handle the amount of power you will need, and always review the manufacturer's instructions to operate it safely. Contact Beltrami Electric to learn more about GenerLink, a transfer switch to safely connect a portable generator and provide you the flexibility to select items to power through your electrical panel (breaker box).

Listen to local news or a NOAA Weather Radio for storm and emergency information and check Beltrami Electric Cooperative's social media or website for power restoration updates.

After the storm, avoid downed power lines and walking through flooded areas where power lines could be submerged. Allow ample room for utility crews to safely perform their jobs, including on your property.

Advance planning for severe storms or other emergencies can reduce stress and anxiety caused by the weather event and can lessen the impact of the storm's effects. Sign up for NOAA emergency alerts and warnings and follow our Facebook page to stay abreast of power restoration efforts and other important co-op news and information.

I hope we don't experience severe storms this summer, but we can never predict Mother Nature's plans. At Beltrami Electric Cooperative we recommend that you act today because there is power in planning. From our co-op family to yours, we hope you have a safe and wonderful summer.

Annual and district meetings

This year's annual meeting will be held Wednesday, August 9 at the Beltrami County Fairgrounds in conjunction with the Beltrami County Fair. This will be the third time we will have held our annual meeting in conjunction with the fair and we are delighted to partner again with the Beltrami County Fair board to host our annual meeting.

Each of the incumbents have indicated their interest in running.

Candidates interested in running for the board must complete and submit to the cooperative a candidate packet no later than five business days prior to the district meeting in which the candidate seeks to run. 1. Check your breakers, fuses, or outdoor disconnect switch to determine if they have tripped off due to a power overload.

2. If you determine the power outage is not within your wiring system, select one of the options below to report your outage.

Keep your contact info up-to-date! If BEC has your current phone number on your account, our automated system will recognize the location you are calling about. If our system doesn't recognize your number, you will need to have your location or account number available.

5 THINGS TO KNOW

about our wind energy

June 15 is Global Wind Day! BEC is celebrating this key renewable resource by reflecting on why wind energy is so important to our diverse power portfolio. Here are some numbers you should know.

1. We were among the <mark>FIRST</mark> in the wind sphere.

Minnkota Power Cooperative's system of members, including BEC, is acknowledged as a regional leader for building the first two commercial-scale, utility-owned wind turbines in North Dakota in 2002. This leadership was recognized by the Department of Energy.

2. Our cooperative system uses energy from **<u>FIVE</u>** wind centers.

Minnkota (our wholesale power provider) owns two separate wind turbines near the towns of Petersburg and Valley City, N.D., and holds purchased power agreements for energy produced at three wind farms near Langdon, Valley City and Center, N.D.

3. More than **<u>ONE-THIRD</u> of our power capacity is wind**.

Wind makes up 34% of our system's generation capacity. Around 56% of our capacity comes from coal at the Milton R. Young Station near Center, N.D., and another 8% comes from hydropower at North Dakota's Garrison Dam. The final 2% comes from the power market and other sources.

4. About 459 megawatts of wind capacity is available in our system.

We never expect wind to be blowing at all times at every one of our wind facilities, so actual electricity output at any particular time can vary dramatically. However, 459 MW is enough to power more than 225,000 homes if every turbine were to hit its peak capacity.

5. Receive up to 100% wind energy from Infinity Renewable Energy.

Members who enroll in the Infinity program can choose a designated percentage of electricity used that they would like to be derived from renewable resources.
