In most cases, a plenum heater can be installed in conjunction with a central air conditioning system or an air-source heat pump.

Be festive without breaking the bank

With holiday lights adorning homes for several months, making the switch to LEDs saves energy. LED holiday lights use 88% less energy than incandescent holiday lights. To put that into perspective, the Department of Energy estimates that with standard holiday decorations, LED lights typically increase energy bills by about \$5 to \$7. But with incandescent lights, energy bills will typically

increase by \$33 or more. For homes that go above and beyond with incandescent holiday lighting (think Clark Griswold), energy bills could increase by as much as \$350. Beyond energy savings, LEDs provide additional benefits, such as being shock-resistant, shatterproof, and cool to the touch, making them safer for the home.

You can also lower energy use by conveniently managing holiday lighting. Smart light timers can help you save energy by connecting to a smartphone app or voice assistant to program lights to turn on and off at set times. If you don't use smart home technology, you can still save energy by using traditional timers. Timers can also be used with a block heater for your vehicle in the winter months.

Cook up energy savings in the kitchen



If you plan to have family and friends over this holiday season, you can cook up energy savings by using small countertop appliances like microwaves, air fryers and slow cookers when possible, as they use much less energy than the stovetop or oven.

When using the stovetop, match the pan size to the burner to maximize the stovetop's efficiency.

Air-source heat pump	Unlike a furnace, an air-source heat pump (ASHP) doesn't burn fuel to make heat. It simply uses electricity to move heat from one place to another. A standard ASHP is a self-contained system that uses existing ductwork. The system is composed of an outdoor compressor unit and an indoor air handling unit. DAILY CYCLING OF ELECTRIC STORAGE HEAT COULD BEGIN IN NOVEMBER

Members heating with electric thermal storage on the off-peak program, such as thermal storage room units, thermal storage furnaces, or slab/in-floor heating, should turn on their heating system prior to Nov. 15 to allow a heat reservoir to build up before daily cycling of loads begins. The actual date daily cycling begins varies each season. Thermal storage heating is controlled each day from 7 a.m. to noon and 5 p.m. to 11 p.m.





America's rural communities are home to millions of men and women who have served in our armed forces, many of whom face challenges due to service-related disabilities. As a result, CoBank, a co-op lender, has partnered with No Barriers USA to honor and support these veterans by sponsoring rural vets with disabilities to experience the No Barriers Warriors program.

The program provides an opportunity for veterans with disabilities to tackle personal challenges, stretch physical and emotional boundaries, and overcome barriers to create positive change. As a sponsor, CoBank covers all costs for each participant, allowing them to challenge their own limitations, both real and perceived, physical and mental. By sharing the experience with other veterans with disabilities, they build a network of support that can last a lifetime.

Beltrami Electric Cooperative's board vice chair Sue Kringen nominated BEC member and Air Force veteran Jaclyn Wizner for the No Barriers Warriors program. Wizner was one of 50 rural veterans selected to participate in the program this year.

Jaclyn and her husband, Jordan, are Air Force veterans and have a 4-year-old daughter. Jaclyn is a rep for the State of Minnesota's Disabled Veteran Outreach Program, which provides career guidance and assists disabled veterans in finding meaningful jobs.

As a veteran, Jaclyn was excited for the opportunity but wasn't sure she would

be able to meet the physical demands of the hike after recuperating from an accident that put her in a wheelchair for a year. However, after receiving clearance from her doctor, she was able to attend the July 2023 expedition. She started by completing the online portion of the program, where she was introduced to 13 others from around the U.S. who would be in her group and set expectations for the experience.

During the five-day hiking expedition through the Rocky Mountains, they were challenged to overcome serious challenges in the wilderness. Jaclyn knew from experience that being with other veterans, they wouldn't let her fail. "If your mind is strong enough, your body will follow," she said. "This was one of the hardest things I've ever done, but at the same time, the most rewarding."

The No Barriers Warriors program is a life-changing experience for veterans, where they once again can find the camaraderie and relationships they experienced in the military. Jaclyn has developed relationships with the others from her group that will last a lifetime. She remains in contact with her group online. They gather remotely to encourage and inspire one another and work toward accomplishing the pledge they set for themselves during their experience.

The No Barriers Warriors program is saving the lives of our veterans and likely saved the life of at least one in Jaclyn's group. "If you are a veteran nominated and given the opportunity to do this program, don't think about it, just do it!" said Jaclyn.

Operation Round Up® helps local organizations

he Beltrami Electric Cooperative Trust Board met in October to review Operation Round Up® grant applications. They received 33 grant requests totaling \$112,371. The Trust had \$41,424.92 in funds available, so it was not easy to select which groups would receive funding and what amount they would receive. The board was diligent in their review process of all grant applications and there were many worthy projects in the group. The board awarded grants to 26 area nonprofit and community organizations totaling \$41,388.

Here are some important details to know about Operation Round Up:

- All funds for Operation Round Up are placed into a separate trust fund, which is not linked to electric accounts.
- The program is run by a board of directors made up of five co-op member volunteers.
- 100% of member donations are used to support local community

- organizations and improve the quality of life in our region.
- The average monthly contribution from participating members is \$0.50, or \$6 per year.
 The maximum annual contribution is \$11.88.
- Contributions to Operation Round Up are tax deductible and will be reflected on your billing statement.
- Participation is voluntary, and members can opt out or back in at any time by contacting our office.

Many local programs and organizations benefit from Operation Round Up, a voluntary, member-driven fundraising program of Beltrami Electric Cooperative, designed to give members a means of working together to use their small change to make a big impact in our local communities. The next application deadline is **MARCH 15, 2024**.

Member privacy – Red Flags Rule

Millions of Americans have their identities stolen each year. As a result of that startling statistic, the Federal Trade Commission has developed a regulation called the "Red Flags Rule." The Red Flags Rule requires businesses to develop a program to detect, prevent and minimize the damage that could result from identity theft.

The data privacy of our members is important to us, and as a Beltrami Electric member, you may be asked to provide additional information and identification when you make inquiries on your account, such as verifying the last four digits of your social security number. A member may complete an Authorized Contact Agreement form to allow us to give account



information to others you want to have access to your account. This permits an Authorized Contact to make inquiries on the account to which they are authorized. The Authorized Contact must provide their name, date of birth and the last four digits of their social security number in order to receive account information. While these practices may seem intrusive, please understand that these procedures are in place to protect your member data and prevent the occurrence of identity theft.
