May is National Electrical Safety Month

Safety is our priority

At Beltrami Electric Cooperative, our mission goes far beyond simply delivering electricity to your homes and businesses. As a member-owned cooperative, we are deeply invested in the well-being of our community, and that includes ensuring you and your loved ones stay safe.

Electricity is an essential part of our lives, but it must be treated with caution and respect. That's why we make safety a top priority – because nothing is more important than protecting the people who make up this cooperative: you, our members.

We are committed to sharing life-saving electrical safety information through our print and digital newsletters, social media, and even local radio. But safety awareness isn't just a one-time conversation; it's something we must practice every day. In fact, we participate in many events throughout the year, delivering electrical safety presentations to local classrooms and emergency response personnel.

Stay safe around electricity

Whether you're working on a home improvement project, cleaning gutters or trimming trees, always be mindful of overhead power lines. Look up and maintain a safe distance, especially from the lines connected to your home. A simple moment of awareness can prevent a dangerous accident.

If your project requires digging – whether for a fence, landscaping or any underground work – never assume you know what's below. **Call 8-1-1** or visit **www. GopherStateOneCall.org** a few days in advance to have underground utilities marked. Taking this precaution can prevent accidental contact with buried electrical lines, which could lead to injury or service disruptions. teach them how to stay safe around electrical equipment. Remind children to never climb trees near power lines, avoid playing on or around pad-mount transformers (those green utility boxes), and fly kites only in wide-open areas far from power lines. These simple rules can help prevent serious accidents.

Be prepared for storms

Severe weather can create hidden electrical hazards, from downed power lines to flooded electrical devices. After a storm, always assume downed lines are energized and dangerous – stay far away and report them immediately. If you experience an outage, know that our crews are working as quickly and safely as possible to restore power.

A commitment to safety education

Beltrami Electric Cooperative is proud to be a partner in the Safe Electricity program, which provides valuable safety resources for all ages. I encourage you to visit **SafeElectricity. org** for engaging videos, interactive games for children and educational materials designed for teachers and families.

You matter to us

The United States has one of the safest and most reliable electrical systems in the world – but we believe there is always more we can do to protect our members. Your safety is, and always will be, a top priority for us.

As an electric cooperative, Beltrami Electric is guided by an elected board of directors which represents its members' best interest when making important decisions. Being a member of the co-op's board is an incredibly important position in our community. A director's decisions will impact issues, such as service rates, rights of way and work plans. 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OPERATION ROUND UP® Small Change, Big Impact

Beltrami Electric Cooperative's Operation Round Up® program continues to showcase the power of collective giving, helping local nonprofit and community organizations thrive. In April, the Beltrami Electric Cooperative Trust Board carefully reviewed 39 grant applications requesting \$114,103 in funding. With \$40,191 in available funds, the board faced tough decisions but ultimately awarded \$40,190 to 21 deserving organizations – ensuring vital programs receive the support they need.

HOW OPERATION ROUND UP WORKS

Operation Round Up is a voluntary giving program where participating Beltrami Electric members round up their monthly electric bills to the nearest dollar. While the average donation is just 50 cents per month (or \$6 a year), these small contributions add up – creating a meaningful funding source for community projects.

KEY PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS:

- 100% of donations go directly to local nonprofits and community groups.
- Funds are managed in a separate trust, ensuring transparency and accountability.
- A five-member volunteer board comprised of Beltrami Electric co-op members oversees fund distribution.
- Contributions are tax-deductible and voluntary, with members able to opt in or out at any time.

A rough-in inspection must be made before any wiring is covered. A final inspection is also required. A: Minnkota's energy portfolio includes a diverse mix of coal, wind and hydro resources. This balanced approach helps ensure a reliable and sustainable energy supply for our members.

Q: Does Minnkota purchase power from Canada?

<u>A:</u> No, Minnkota does not rely on Canadian electricity purchases. This means that tariffs or trade regulations on Canadian power imports do not directly affect our energy costs or supply. By maintaining energy independence, our members are protected from potential price increases or supply disruptions.

Q: Can members see where their power comes from?

A: Absolutely! Every July, we offer members the chance to tour our generation resources and see firsthand how our power is produced. The tour includes visits to Minnkota Power Cooperative, Oliver III Wind Energy, Garrison Dam, Milton R. Young Station and BNI Coal.
