


Investing in people


Northern Solar

by Beltrami Electric Cooperative

Just over a year ago, we announced our plans to construct an 80-kilowatt (kW) Direct Current (DC) community solar garden array on our headquarters property. This project is an effort to provide interested members with an option to purchase renewable, locally-produced, solar energy. Community solar is an affordable, low-risk way for BEC members to enjoy the benefits of solar energy without the hassle of designing, permitting, installing, maintaining and insuring their own solar array.

The planned solar array was to consist of 192 photovoltaic panels rated at 400 watts each. The cost for members who wish to subscribe to the Northern Solar project is \$1,295 for a full panel's output or \$647.50 for a half panel's output. In return, members will be allocated the energy produced (kWh) by their subscribed panel(s) for a 20-year term, to offset their kWh on their electric bill.

Each panel is estimated to produce approximately 450 kWh annually, which translates into an average of about 37.5 kWh per month. A panel will produce more in the summer months and less in the winter months.



We will not be able to move forward with this project until we get at least 50 percent (96 of the 192 panels) subscribed. As of the middle of July, we have received subscriptions for just 68.5 panels. We need at least another 27.5 panels subscribed to before we can break ground. Operation Round Up





What is Operation Round Up?

- Operation Round Up was created in 1989 by a cooperative in South Carolina. Since that time, hundreds of electric cooperatives around the nation have adopted the program.
- It's a charitable program designed to give members a means of working together to use their small change to make a big impact in their local communities.
- A separate board, made up of five volunteers from our community, meet quarterly to review applications for grants and disburse the funds.

How does Operation Round Up work?

- Operation Round Up is just what its name implies. Each month, BEC "rounds up" the electric bills of participating members to the next highest dollar. For example, a member's monthly bill of \$78.65 would be automatically rounded up to \$79, with the additional 35 cents going to Operation Round Up.
- The average contribution per member is approximately 50 cents a month, or \$6 per year. Donations are tax deductible, and members will receive an annual summary of their contributions on their January billing statement.

What are some possible uses for Operation Round Up?

- Examples of grants for funding would be local fire department equipment, youth and school groups and activities, local arts and education, senior citizen groups and many other various community programs and projects.
- Grants will not be going to large charities; they will stay in our community, for the benefit of our community.

Why should I participate?

This program's sole purpose is to improve the quality of life for our community. Through
a cooperative and unified program, members will have a means of donating to worthy
causes, and, through Operation Round Up, the small change of individuals can add up
and make a big difference for our area. Together, we can do some wonderful things for
our local communities.

Members who choose not to contribute to Operation Round Up can simply "opt out" of this voluntary program by notifying BEC by phone, email or through our website.

Applications due Sept. 30

Do you know a local not-for-profit organization that could benefit from an Operation Round Up grant? Encourage your local fire & rescue, 4-H, early childhood or senior citizens group and others to apply.

Applications for the Beltrami Electric (Operation Round Up) Trust are now available. Grants will be awarded to nonprofit community-based organizations that demonstrate a commitment to enhancing the quality of life in our region. Projects should fit one or more of these categories: Community Service, Economic Development, Education & Youth and the Environment.

Grants will not be made for lobbying, political and religious organizations, veteran, fraternal and labor organizations, fundraising dinners, raffles, capital fund campaigns, national fund drives, advertising or ongoing operational expenses.

If your organization wishes to apply for Operation Round Up funds, grant application forms are available in our office or on our website at **www. beltramielectric.com**. The first application deadline is Sept. 30, 2016, and applications must be received at Beltrami Electric by 4:30 p.m. to be eligible. Funds will be disbursed in October.

- **2.** After you have given the cooperative your cell phone number(s), go to our website www.beltramielectric.com and register for the service. You can do this by clicking the orange "Report Outage" icon, then clicking "Sign Up for Outage Texting." The registration process is simple and takes less than two minutes.
- 3. You will be given an outage "texting number." Add this number to your contacts on your cell phone so it's ready when an outage occurs.

Now you are ready to text us in the event your power goes out. Please call the office during normal office hours, Monday - Friday, 8 a.m. - 4:30 p.m., if you have any questions or comments.



Board Meeting Highlights

Beltrami Electric's board of directors conducted its monthly meeting Wednesday, June 29, 2016. A quorum of directors were present.

The following reports were given:

- · Rich Riewer gave an update on the new AMI meter system and an amendment to the current Work
- CEO Echternach presented Policy 310 regarding AMI System installation.
- · Chris Kelsey discussed a new option of cell phone texting of outage information.
- CEO Echternach gave his monthly report, including discussion on Northern Solar, Cooperative Response Center and the legislative candidate forum to be held at BEC
- · Sid Sletten gave the financial report for May, including review of work orders and special equipment, the annual report on the procedures of BEC in regard to the Red Flag Rule and reviewed Form 990.
