National Electrical Safety Month

Safe Electricity.org

Keep your family safe in your home by brushing up on how to use electricity safely and by periodically giving your home an electrical checkup:

- Make sure outlets in the kitchen, bathrooms, laundry, workshop, basement, garage or any area with access to water are equipped with a ground fault circuit interrupter (GFCI). A GFCI monitors the flow of electricity in a circuit. If there is an irregularity, even a small one, the flow of electricity is shut off, preventing an electric shock. GFCIs should be tested monthly to ensure they are working properly.
- Periodically check outlets for loose-fitting plugs. Replace missing or broken wall plates so wiring and components are not exposed.
- If you have young children or pets at home, install tamper resistant outlets (TROs) or cover unused outlets with plastic safety caps.
- Never force plugs into outlets, and never remove the grounding pin (third prong) to make a three-prong plug fit a two-prong outlet.
- · Avoid overloading outlets with adapters and too many appliance plugs.
- Extension cords are designed for temporary use only. They should never be put in place as a long-term solution. A qualified electrician can help you install the necessary wiring and receptacle outlets for a permanent solution.
- Make sure cords are not frayed or cracked, placed under carpets or rugs or located in high traffic areas. If a cord is damaged in any way, replace it. Do not nail or staple them to walls, floors or other objects.
- Also, as a safety precaution, make it a habit to remove a cord from the outlet by pulling on the plug rather than the cord itself.

- Check periodically for loose wall receptacles, wires or loose lighting fixtures.
 Listen for popping or sizzling sounds behind walls.
 Immediately shut off, then professionally replace light switches that are hot to the touch and lights that spark and flicker.
- Check that light bulb wattage matches the fixture requirements.
 Replace bulbs that have higher wattage ratings than recommended.
 Screw them in securely. Also, consider using LED bulbs to reduce energy use in your home.
- Make sure fuses are properly sized for the circuit they are protecting.
 If you do not know the correct rating, have an electrician identify
 and label the correct size to be used. Always replace a fuse with the
 same size you are removing. Check to make sure circuit breakers are
 working properly.
- If an appliance repeatedly blows a fuse, trips a circuit breaker or has given you an electrical shock, immediately unplug it and have it repaired or replaced. Look for cracks or damage in wiring and connectors, and use surge protectors to protect electronics.
- If fuses blow or trip frequently, have a professional determine the appropriate service requirements for your home.

Annual meeting recap and legislative update

hank you to all who attended your cooperative's 78th annual meeting April 19 at the Bemidji High School. I always enjoy the annual meeting. It's a great time to connect with fellow members, have a nice meal and hear how your cooperative is doing. For those of you who weren't able to attend the meeting this year, members Charlie Parson, John Lund and Judy Honer were re-elected to the board, each to a three-year term.

Those of you who attended the annual meeting heard an engaging Q&A with Jim Horan with the Minnesota Rural Electric Association. Jim shared his perspective on several state and federal issues affecting your cooperative including:

Move Over and Slow Down HF 2719/SF2977

This legislation would require drivers to move over and slow down for utility workers in the same fashion that is required for law enforcement. We want to keep our employees and the general public safe and we support this bill.

Third Party Sales HF 2685/SF 2919

This bill would allow third parties to come between the cooperative and its members and use the electric distribution system as free riders without having to become a public utility and operate under the same rules as a public utility. The bill could lead to the erosion of energy sales and discourage maintenance and investment in the distribution system. We oppose the bill.

Conservation Improvement Program Reform

We continue to educate legislators of the need to reform the existing Conservation Improvement Program that mandates electric and gas utilities to conserve (reduce) 1.5 percent of their retail energy sales annually. Not many

business models are sustainable under a mandate that requires them to sell less of their product year after year. We're working to change that law and we will continue to promote the wise use of electricity and beneficial electrification, including equipment such as storage water heaters, storage space heating, air-source heat pumps, ground source heat pumps and electric vehicles.

These types of loads are beneficial not only to those using them, but to all cooperative members. Beneficial electrification allows us to use existing generation and distribution resources more efficiently and spread the fixed costs of our operation over more kilowatt-hours sold. It also allows us to better integrate renewable generation resources. As a result, we will continue to promote beneficial electrification in the best interest of our member-owners.

Federal issues



On the federal level, we continue to push Congress to fully fund programs that improve the quality of life in rural America. Specifically, the Farm Bill must include robust rural development programs that facilitate the innovative work electric co-ops do to generate and distribute electricity, help consumers manage their energy use, deploy advanced grid tools and manage the electric grid more securely and efficiently. The Farm Bill must also support the role of many electric

cooperatives as important economic development organizations in their communities, as well as the Rural Utilities Service Electric Loan Program. This is our primary lending agency from which we use funds to support our construction work plans and maintain your electric distribution system.

We were disappointed the Administration's fiscal year 2019 budget proposed to sell the transmission assets of the Power Marketing Administration (PMA) and Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA), as well as change the rate structure from a cost-based system to a market-based system. Selling the transmission assets to send more money to Washington has been a bad idea

for decades, and asking consumers to pay more for power than is necessary to cover the costs of the PMAs to generate that power only exacerbates that problem. Currently, not-for-profit electric cooperatives receive power from the PMAs, in our case through an allocation of hydro power through the Western Area Power Administration (WAPA), through our wholesale power

We were pleased to see the budget included funding for the Low Income Heating and Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP). Many of our members rely on this funding to heat their homes and we assist our members in accessing this funding. We will continue to advocate

for this program to be fully funded.

As I've said before ... cooperatives were born in politics and will remain involved with politics. As such, we will continue to advocate at the state and federal level on behalf of our memberowners


