The off-peak heating advantage



What is off-peak heating?

You can enjoy the comfort and convenience of electric heat and save money, too, by installing off-peak heating in your new or existing home. An off-peak electric heating system consists of an electric heat source as its main component and a supplemental heating source that will typically operate 100-300 hours per year during times of peak electrical demand in the region.

Can off-peak reduce my heating costs?

The off-peak program offers a lower electric heating rate that is about 40-50% below the regular service rate, making electricity one of the most stable and cost-effective energy sources available. With the off-peak rate, electricity is very competitive with other heating fuels such as propane or fuel oil, and the off-peak rate really looks good during times when fossil fuel prices rise dramatically.

Is it easy to convert an existing furnace to an off-peak heating system?

Yes. A home with an existing fossil fuel heating system can be converted to off-peak electric heating very easily. The Energy Experts at Beltrami Electric will be happy to advise you on the best electric alternative to meet your specific needs.

Why is off-peak heating environmentally friendly?

By temporarily controlling off-peak heating systems, your cooperative avoids the need to build a new fossil fuel power plant just to meet peak electricity demand. With more than 50,000 consumers participating, the off-peak program is one of the largest energy efficiency efforts in the region.

What options do I have for off-peak heating?



Plenum heaters Electric plenum heaters turn your existing fossil fuel furnace into a dual-fuel heating system. You are able to use the most efficient heating source - fossil fuel or electricity - at any time.

Air-source heat pumps

Air-source heat pumps work iust like a central air conditioner in the summer. In the spring and fall, they provide superefficient supplemental heat.

Underfloor heating

Underfloor heating is a popular off-peak option because the system transfers consistently across the floor to reach people and objects, providing both comfort and efficiency.







Thermal storage heaters

Electric thermal storage heaters draw electricity during off-peak hours when it is cheaper. Heat is stored in specially designed bricks to provide comfort 24 hours a day.

Geothermal heat pump

Geothermal heat pumps provide the highest efficiency for space heating and cooling available today. The system transfers heat to and from the earth using only small amounts of electricity.

Thermal storage water heaters

Electric thermal storage water heaters only draw electricity during off-peak hours when it is cheaper. Hot water is stored in a specially insulated tank designed to meet your 24-hour needs.

Cold Weather Disconnect Rule

216B.097 COLD WEATHER RULE; COOPERATIVE OR MUNICIPAL UTILITY

<u>Subdivision 1</u>. Application; notice to residential customer.

(a) A municipal utility or a cooperative electric association must not disconnect and must reconnect the utility service of a residential customer during the period between October 15 and April 15 if the disconnection affects the primary heat source for the residential unit and all of the following conditions are met:

(1) The household income of the customer is at or below 50% of the state median household income. A municipal utility or cooperative electric association utility may (i) verify income on forms it provides or (ii) obtain verification of income from the local energy assistance provider. A customer is deemed to meet the income requirements of this clause if the customer receives any form of public assistance, including energy assistance that uses an income eligibility threshold set at or below 50% of the state median household income.

(2) A customer enters into and makes reasonably timely payments under a payment agreement that considers the financial resources of the household.

(3) A customer receives referrals to energy assistance, weatherization, conservation, or other programs likely to reduce the customer's energy bills.

(b) A municipal utility or a cooperative electric association must, between August 15 and October 15 each year, notify all residential customers of the provisions of this section.

<u>Subdivision 2</u>. Notice to residential customer facing disconnection.

Before disconnecting service to a residential customer during the period between October 15 and April 15, a municipal utility or cooperative electric association must provide the following information to a customer:

(1) a notice of proposed disconnection;

(2) a statement explaining the customer's rights and responsibilities;

(3) a list of local energy assistance providers;

(4) forms on which to declare inability to pay; and

(5) a statement explaining available time

payment plans and other opportunities to secure continued utility service.

<u>Subdivision 3</u>. Restrictions if disconnection necessary.

(a) If a residential customer must be involuntarily disconnected between October 15 and April 15 for failure to comply with subdivision 1, the disconnection must not occur:

(1) on a Friday, unless the customer declines to enter into a payment agreement offered that day in person or via personal contact by telephone by a municipal utility or cooperative electric association;

(2) on a weekend, holiday, or the day before a holiday;

(3) when utility offices are closed; or

(4) after the close of business on a day when disconnection is permitted, unless a field representative of a municipal utility or cooperative electric association who is authorized to enter into a payment agreement, accept payment, and continue service, offers a payment agreement to the customer.

Further, the disconnection must not occur until at least 20 days after the notice required in subdivision 2 has been mailed to the customer or 15 days after the notice has been personally delivered to the customer.

(b) If a customer does not respond to a disconnection notice, the customer must not be disconnected until the utility investigates whether the residential unit is actually occupied. If the unit is found to be occupied, the utility must immediately inform the occupant of the provisions of this section. If the unit is unoccupied, the utility must give seven days' written notice of the proposed disconnection to the local energy assistance provider before making a disconnection.

(c) If, prior to disconnection, a customer appeals a notice of involuntary disconnection, as provided by the utility's established appeal procedure, the utility must not disconnect until the appeal is resolved.

<u>Subdivison 4</u>. *Application to service limiters*.

For the purposes of this section, "disconnection" includes a service or load limiter or any device that limits or interrupts electric service in any way.



Need help paying your electric bill?

The Energy Assistance Program (EAP) helps pay for home heating costs and furnace repairs for incomequalified households. We urge you to contact them immediately to avoid disconnection if you feel you are eligible for aid. (Eligibility is based on energy costs, household size and the three most recent months of income). The following agencies may be able to assist you with your electric bill.

This is to certify that the main source of heat for my home (more than 50%) is furnished by **permanently** installed electric heating equipment (not portable) and I, therefore, am eligible for the electric heating sales tax exemption as provided by Minnesota State Tax Fact Sheet 157. This exemption is for the billing months of November through April only. **Exemption forms should be resubmitted every 3-4 years. Please notify us if you change from electric heat to a different primary heating source.*

Electricity sold for residential use is not taxable for the billing months of November through April when sold to metered members who use electric heat as their primary source of residential heat. If more than one type of heat is used, electricity is not taxable if electric is the primary source of heat. Primary source of residential heat is the source that supplied more heat than any other source for the largest period of time during the heating season. Members with an off-peak meter are only exempted sales tax on the electricity that is recorded on the off-peak meter.

Some buildings have both residential quarters and commercial operations. If there is one meter for the entire building, the exemption applies if more than 50% of the square footage of the building is residential.

Complete and submit the form above only if you are eligible for the exemption. If you have more than one account, an exemption form must be filed with each location.

The State of Minnesota recommends the exemption forms should be updated and resubmitted every three to four years to be eligible for the exemption. Members who receive a tax exemption when electric heat is not their primary source of heat are in violation of the sales tax law.

Commercial Accounts must use an ST3 form, which is available on our website.
