All digging requires the 48-hour notification so that buried telephone lines, television cables, pipelines, utility electrical lines, and municipal water and sewer lines can be located to ensure that none will be severed or damaged.

Striving for electric grid resiliency

Resiliency of the grid is one of the most popular concepts being talked about in the electric industry today. This concept often makes headlines in the wake of natural disasters such as hurricanes, tornadoes and more familiar to us (and oddly enough to Texans), winter storms. Here in Minnesota, what does grid resiliency mean for you?

Here's what it means to us. Resiliency is many things – it's reliability in your electric service, it's our ability to efficiently restore your power, it's being able to meet the demands of new technology and it's how we serve you with various generation sources without skipping a beat. Ultimately, resilience is how we deliver on our promise to improve the quality of life for our memberowners.

When it comes to having a resilient electric grid, it begins with a system that is designed and built to withstand high winds, powerful storms, cybersecurity threats and other disruptions that could result in outages. Back in the 1970s, your cooperative made the business decision to begin installing power lines underground. This proved to be a wise decision as your



distribution system is now nearly 75% underground and we're leading the state. As such, over the last 50 years we've focused on building and maintaining a resilient distribution system to benefit our members through improved reliability.

A resilient grid is also flexible and adaptable by allowing different types

of generation – such as wind, solar, coal and hydro – to seamlessly work together to provide you with safe and reliable power. The way our systems react to advancements in technology – from demand response investments such as our load management program, to serving the future needs of electric vehicles – all factors into the resilience of our grid.

Resiliency is a 24/7, 365-days-ayear task. Whether it's the power lines, substations or generation facilities on our grid, it takes proactive maintenance and investment to keep them running smoothly. That's why we continually invest in your distribution system and take a proactive approach to maintenance.

In a similar way to how we maintain our vehicles with regular oil changes, inspections and tire rotations, a grid must also be properly maintained. Throughout the year, we regularly conduct line inspections. Our goal is to find a problem before it becomes one. For example, if we find a weak pole that has damage from termites or bears, we replace that pole. Doing so ensures that pole is as strong – or as resilient – as it can be.

Living in Minnesota, we know that significant power outages can occur, especially as we enter spring and summer storm season. Because we continue to invest in construction and maintenance, we have confidence in the resiliency of our system to recover from the situation with as little disruption as possible.

In the dictionary, resilience is defined as "the ability to bounce back, recover quickly and go back into shape or position after being stretched." When it comes to providing our member-owners with resilient service, this is what we work toward – day in and day out!

ANATOMY OF A LINEWORKER

HAND LINE BLOCK

Lineworkers can't carry everything up on a pole, and the pulley block – the signature component of the hand line – is used to raise and lower heavy equipment.

HARD HAT

A hard hat provides insulated protection against electrical hazards and shields the head from blows and falling objects.

WOOD POLE FALL PROTECTION BELT

Before a lineworker starts climbing a pole, they loop a safety strap around the pole and rehook the strap to their equipment belt. This serves as an added safety precaution and allows the lineworker to work with both hands free.



DITTY BAG

This canvas bag hangs from the equipment belt and holds the materials that lineworkers need at the ready for any number of jobs.

BOOTS

These boots help prevent lineworkers from gaffing themselves in the leg. Serrated heels provide a better grip and steel shanks provide extra support on the pole.

HAND LINE

This is a lineworker's lifeline. Complete with steel clips and a pulley block, this rope, which hangs from a pole's cross arm, is strong enough for any job – from the routine hoisting of equipment to lifesaving missions.

TOOL POUCH

This bag hangs from the back of the equipment belt and carries a wide variety of tools, such as pliers and wrenches.

GAFFS

Razor-sharp steel points are strapped to boots for climbing poles. Only the tips dig into wood, helping lineworkers climb more safely and efficiently.

Your energy. Your choice.

The Infinity Renewable Energy program allows consumers to decide how much of the electricity they purchase is generated by renewable resources. By enrolling in the Infinity program, cooperative members can choose a designated number of kilowatt-hours or percentage of



electricity used that they would like to be derived from renewable resources. While it is not possible to direct where electrons are specifically delivered on the electric grid, it is possible to ensure that the renewable energy purchased is from a resource connected to the Minnkota transmission system. The record of that purchase and the proof that it was reserved for a specific consumer is done through a renewable energy credit.

Renewable Wind Energy is available at two levels:

<u>Option 1</u>: Purchase blocks of 100 kilowatt-hours for 50 cents/block. For each (100 kWh) block you purchase, there is an additional charge of 50 cents on your bill for renewable wind energy.

<u>Option 2</u>: Purchase 100% of your monthly consumption and pay an additional \$0.005 per kWh on your bill for renewable wind energy.

April is National Safe Digging Month

If you are planning an outdoor project, don't forget to **CALL BEFORE YOU DIG.**

That's right. Digging safety is so vitally important that there is an entire month dedicated to it. Your yard may be hiding underground utility pipes, cables and wires, so if you're planning a spring project that involves a shovel or excavator, it's critical to call 8-1-1 before you start. A quick call can keep your project on schedule, your family safe and your neighbors connected to the utilities they need.

Calling is critical

Installing a mailbox? CALL 8-1-1.



Planting a garden? CALL 8-1-1.



Building a deck?

The process is easy



Call 8-1-1 or submit a request online two to three days before you begin. The utilities affected by your digging will be notified of your project.



2 WAIT

It may take two to three days for utilities to send a locator to mark any underground lines.



CONFIRM

Compare the marks on your yard to the list of utilities contacted by 8-1-1. Confirm that all entities have responded to the request.



Protect and follow the utility markers – the flags and/or paint will remain important guides throughout your project.



DIG CAREFULLY

Be sure to avoid digging within two feet of the markers on all sides. If you can't, you'll need to consider moving your project.

- Rising costs for materials, equipment and fuel have been impacting electric rates for utilities across the state, but Beltrami Electric continues to manage rising costs and member resources wisely. We are pleased to report your electric rates will remain stable for the fourth consecutive year.

If you're planning a new service installation or service improvement this year, supply chain issues will have a first-hand impact. Getting an early start is important. Please let us know in advance to ensure we have equipment available when needed and avoid any delays in service construction. Because of escalating costs for fuel and materials, costs for new service installations and service upgrades are expected to increase this year. New service construction and service improvement costs will be available in April for the 2022 season. Please call or visit our website for line construction information and applications.

connect a portable generator to your home with

When you have lost power, a portable generator can temporarily provide needed electricity. However, it may present serious hazards if not used properly.



NEVER plug a portable generator directly into your home. This can cause electricity to feed back through your home onto the utility's system. This "**backfeed**" can be deadly for lineworkers working on lines that they believe are off and anyone near downed power lines.



The GenerLink is a 200-amp UL listed transfer switch to safely connect a generator to your home.

Purchase a generator that can provide the amount of power you expect to need during an outage.

Beltrami Electric Cooperative's technicians will install the device at your electric meter.

GenerLink allows you flexibility and control to select what you want to run using your home's circuit panel.

YOUR CO-OP CELEBRATES ENVIRONMENTAL RESPONSIBILITY ON EARTH DAY

Environmental stewardship is a core value of Beltrami Electric Cooperative and our wholesale power provider Minnkota Power Cooperative. As local energy providers, we operate facilities that run 24 hours a day in the communities where we live, work, raise families and enjoy the great outdoors. Simply put, we have a personal stake in ensuring our air, land and water stay in pristine condition for future

generations. On Earth Day, April 22, we're reflecting on the ways we've helped make the generation and delivery of electricity more responsible, while also helping you – our member – use energy more wisely.

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GENERATION

Beltrami Electric Cooperative utilizes a diverse mix of energy resources, including coal, wind and hydro power, to meet your 24/7 needs. About 42% of the generation capacity available is derived from carbon-free resources. Efforts are currently being explored to further reduce CO₂ emissions at the coal-based Milton R. Young Station through Project Tundra. The project would install technologies capable of removing approximately 90% of the CO₂ from either generator at the facility. The facility already operates cleanly thanks to \$425 million in emissions control technologies, while strict reclamation standards require that all land mined must be restored to original condition or better.

FARTHDAY

POWER DELIVERY

The routing of power lines takes into account environmentally sensitive areas and the migratory patterns of birds. Through its blink outage mitigation efforts, Minnkota has installed technologies on its power lines to help prevent birds from perching and other animals from climbing poles where they may encounter danger. Other technologies are installed when necessary to make lines more visible for birds. When viable, Beltrami Electric lines are converted from overhead to underground in an effort to limit power outages and reduce environmental impacts.



AT HOME

Beltrami Electric has the energy experts available to help you save money and use electricity wisely.
